From the failed attempt to ban communism in 1951 to the unsuccessful Voice referendum in 2023, Australians have been cautious about constitutional change, approving only eight out of 45 referendum proposals. They interview leading proponents of constitutional change and analyse each referendum campaign, the public response and the forces that shaped the outcome. 





It has long seemed self-evident that women care for babies and men do other things. Hasn't it always been so? When evolutionary science came along, it rubber-stamped this venerable division of labor: males evolved to compete for status and mates, while females were purpose-built to gestate, suckle, and otherwise nurture the victors' offspring. But come the twenty-first century, increasing numbers of men are tending babies, sometimes right from birth.

From celebrated evolutionary anthropologist and primatologist Sarah Blaffer Hrdy, *Father Time* traces the deep history of male nurturing. Traversing millions of years across evolution, this book expands our understanding of what it means to be a father.

Sarah Blaffer Hrdy is professor emerita of anthropology at the University of California, Davis. She is the author of The Woman That Never Evolved, Mother Nature, and Mothers and Others: The Evolutionary Origins of Mutual Understanding.

THE FAN WHO KNEW TOO MUCH Nev Fountain





Can an eleven-year-old boy succeed where others have failed? Can he recover a kidnapped child, disprove a false accusation of assault or win a sleep-deprivation competition that has driven others mad with tragic consequences?


A razor-sharp psychological suspense about two librarians whose lives become dangerously intertwined.


