


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# When the Zoo Followed Me Home Teaching Notes

# Synopsis:

After a trip to the zoo, a young boy discovers the animals have followed him home—and are hiding around the house! There's a lion by the couch, a bat on the ceiling, and even an elephant in the garage! With all these animals around, there isn't much room, and with a baby due soon, this little boy will soon learn that there can be space for everyone. When the Zoo Followed Me Home is a delightfully illustrated and whimsical story that explores imagination, discovery, and growing as a family.

# In the classroom:

### **BEFORE READING**

Exploring the Cover:

- What can children see on the cover?
  - What animals can you spot?
  - Where are they?
- How does the cover make you feel?
  - Why is this?
- What do you think the story will be about?
- If you could bring home an animal from the zoo, which one would it be?
- Have you ever been to a zoo?
  - O What was your favourite animal?
- If you had a pet elephant or giraffe, where would it sleep?
- Have you ever imagined something that wasn't really there?
- How would you feel if your house was suddenly full of animals?

# **DURING READING**

Personal, Social & Emotional Development (PSED)

- How does the child feel about all the animals arriving?
- Why do you think the child is keeping the animals a secret from their parents?
- Do you think the animals are real, or are they part of the child's imagination?
- Have you ever felt unsure about something new, like starting school or meeting a new family member?
- How does the child's feeling change from the start of the book to the end?

# Understanding the World (UTW)

- What different animals are there in the story?
  - O Where can you find these animals in the wild?
- How do animals move differently? (Flamingos stand, snakes slither, bats hang.)
- What do you think these animals would eat in real life?
  - o Would they eat the same things at home?
- What happens when a family gets bigger?
  - O What does a new sibling need?

### Science

• What do animals need to survive?

- O Would a giraffe or any of the other animals be happy in a house?
- O Why or why not?
- What are the different places that animals live? (Birds have nests, meerkats live underground.)
- What do you think would happen if animals don't have enough space?
  - O How would this make them feel?

### Literacy

- Listen for rhymes Can children hear words that sound the same? (e.g., "room" and "broom")
- What describing words (adjectives) does the author use for the animals?
- What would you do if a zoo followed you home? How would you tell the story?

## **AFTER READING**

Analysis and Interpretation:

- What happened in the story?
  - o Can you retell it in your own words?
- Why do you think the animals had to go back to the zoo?
- How did the child feel about the baby before and after the animals arrived?
- What did the animals help the child understand?
- Do you think the child was imagining the animals or really seeing them?

### PSED - Reflection

- Have any children ever felt nervous or excited about something new?
- What makes you feel safe at home? (A pet, a stuffed toy, family members?)
- What would you say to the child in the story about getting a new sibling?

# Art and Creativity:

- Ask children to draw a picture of what their house would look like if animals followed them home.
- Make up a new ending—what if the animals didn't want to leave?
- Children imagine that they are one of the zoo animals—ask them to write or act out what they would say about their adventure.

# **CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES**

### Movement & Drama - "Move Like an Animal"

- Call out different animals from the story, and ask children move like them (slither like a snake, stomp like an elephant, hop like a possum).

# Science & Sorting - "Where Do They Live?"

- Print pictures of the animals in the story. Ask children to sort them into categories:
  - o Animals that live in the jungle, savanna, ocean, or underground.
  - o Animals that could live in a house vs. those that wouldn't fit!

# Math & Spatial Awareness – "Can an Elephant Fit in a Bathtub?

- Use blocks or paper cutouts to measure different classroom objects. Compare sizes of zoo animals:
  - o Could a giraffe fit inside the classroom?
  - O How big is an elephant compared to a bathtub?

### Writing & Imagination – "The Day the Aquarium Followed Me Home"

- Ask children to write their own story that takes place in a different environment (aquarium, farm, dinosaur park). What would follow them home? Where would they hide?

### Art & Observation - "Hidden Animals"

- Ask children to draw a picture of their home—but hide several zoo animals inside. See if your classmates can find them!

# Emotional Awareness - "What Helps You Feel Safe?"

- Discuss things that make us feel safe (stuffed toys, nightlights, hugs, routines).
- Ask children to draw or write about something that makes them feel comforted.
