

The shape of family has changed in the 21st century. While the nuclear family still exists, there are many more types of kinship that surround us.

Kin is an investigation into the ways we choose, or choose not, to have children today. It delves into the experiences of couples without children, single parents by choice, rainbow families, and investigates the impacts of adoption, sperm donation, IVF and surrogacy, and the potential for a future of designer babies. Assisted-reproductive technology has developed quickly, and the ways in which we think and speak about its implications – both legally and ethically – need to catch up.

Chapters cover soil preparation, methods of propagating, chitting, planting, earthing-up and recommended varieties from King Edward to Kerr's Pink. It also describe how to guard against common pests and diseases.


Over 3 million years ago, our ancestors realised they could break apart rocks for sharp edges to cut meat. That discovery changed the fate of our species and our planet.

AS GODS AMONG MEN: A HISTORY OF THE RICH IN THE WEST

How the rich and the super-rich throughout Western history accumulated their wealth, behaved (or misbehaved and helped (or didn't help their communities in times of crisis.

The rich have always fascinated, sometimes in problematic ways. Medieval thinkers feared that the super-rich would act 'as gods among men'; much more recently Thomas Piketty made wealth central to discussions of inequality.

In this book, Guido Alfani offers a history of the rich and super-rich in the West, examining who they were, how they accumulated their wealth and what role they played in society. Covering the last thousand years, with frequent incursions into antiquity, and integrating recent research on economic inequality, Alfani finds – despite the different paths to wealth in different eras – fundamental continuities in the behaviour of the rich and public attitudes towards wealth across Western history. His account offers a novel perspective on current debates about wealth and income disparity.

Guido Alfani is professor of economic history at Bocconi University, Milan. He is the author of Calamities and the Economy in Renaissance Italy: The Grand Tour of the Horsemen of the Apocalypse and the coauthor of The Lion's Share: Inequality and the Rise of the Fiscal State in Preindustrial Europe.



WHY FLYING IS MISERABLE: AND HOW TO FIX IT



Why are the airlines always in a crisis?

Everyone has a horror story about air travel – cancellations, delays, lost baggage, tiny seats, poor service. In this day and age, there is no reason that flying should be this bad. In *Why Flying Is Miserable*, Ganesh Sitaraman, a law professor and policy expert, explains how this happened: It was a conscious choice made by Washington in the 1970s to roll back many forms of regulation that began during the New Deal, in the name of unimpeded capitalism and more competition. Today, the industry is an oligopoly, with only four too-big-to-fail airlines that have received billions of dollars in taxpayer bailouts and still can't offer reliable service.

Miserable air travel is the perfect symbol of the type of unregulated capitalism that America has unleashed. But there are ways to fix airlines – and, by extension, many other sectors of industry – because, after a half-century run, people are sick and tired of the turbulence that deregulation has brought to our economy.

Ganesh Sitaraman teaches and writes about constitutional law, the regulatory state, economic policy, democracy and foreign affairs. He is a professor of Law at Vanderbilt University Law School in Nashville, Tennessee.



DETHRONED: THE DOWNFALL OF INDIA'S PRINCELY STATES

The dramatic true story of the betrayal of hundreds of Indian princely states by both the departing British and the new Congress government.

In July 1947, India's last Viceroy, Lord Louis Mountbatten, stood before New Delhi's Chamber of Princes to deliver the most important speech of his career. He had just three weeks to convince over 550 sovereign princely states – some tiny, some the size of Britain – to become part of a free India.


Once Britain's most faithful allies, the princes could choose between joining India or Pakistan, or declaring independence. This is a saga of intrigue, brinkmanship and broken promises, wrought by Mountbatten and two of independent India's founding fathers: the country's most senior civil servant, V.P. Menon, and Congress strongman Vallabhbhai Patel. What India's architects described as a 'bloodless revolution' was anything but, as violence engulfed Kashmir and Indian troops crushed Hyderabad's dreams of independence.

Most princes accepted the inevitable, exchanging their power for guarantees of privileges and titles in perpetuity. But these dynasties were still led to extinction – not by the sword, but by political expediency – leaving them with little more than fading memories of a glorified past.

John Zubrzycki *PhD* has worked in India as a foreign correspondent and diplomat. His books with Hurst are Dethroned; The House of Jaipur; and Empire of Enchantment, chosen by William Dalrymple as a Book of the Year. He is also the author of The Shortest History of India.






Sugar is an intimate portrayal of grief, friendship, and culture clash that will prompt new ways of thinking about the world.




Infatuation. Reincarnation. Damnation.




